Southwark Dyslexia Assessment Referral Information

Southwark LA remains committed to supporting our schools to identify and provide effective intervention for pupils who have special educational needs but may not need an Education, Health and Care plan assessment.

Some children experience literacy difficulties that are appropriately supported and improved through high quality teaching and appropriate evidence based interventions ordinarily available within schools.

A very small minority of pupils however, prove to have literacy difficulties that are more complex and enduring despite this support having been in place. For these pupils consideration may be given as to whether a specialist SpLD assessment is required to understand their strengths and difficulties better.

Southwark is able to offer access to specialist SpLD assessments free to our maintained schools for pupils in Yr 3 to Yr 8 inclusive who meet the criteria (see referral form).

The referral form and the supporting evidence once signed by the parent should be returned to maria.blanchard-rowe@southwark.gov.uk.

Not all referrals will be accepted, some the LA may feel do not meet the criteria and the school will be advised of that accordingly. Others may be determined as not appropriate by the assessor, and again the LA will inform schools of that decision.

We want as many schools as possible to have the opportunity to have access to this limited resource so we request that schools prioritise pupils where they feel they have more than one pupil requiring assessment. Also as there is likely to be a high level of demand some referrals will be accepted but put on a waiting list.
